





Active Transportation Network and Classifications

Regional Routes

 Regional Routes are the highest functional classification for the active transportation network. These routes should provide the highest quality facilities and greatest level of comfort (lowest level of traffic stress, LTS 1), and appeal to the widest cross section of users.

Connector Routes

 Connector Routes serve as secondary and/or shorter, regionally significant connections between the Regional Routes and high-priority destinations.
 Connector Routes are also desired to be high quality and comfortable for most users (level of traffic stress 2 or LTS 2).

Supporting Routes

• The Supporting Route classification was developed to distinguish priority between Connector Routes. Supporting Routes will be treated similarly to Connector Routes in terms of design guidance and policy implementation (LTS 2); however, they will take lower priority.
