

Problem/Opportunity/Issue Description and Need (Program Manager)

DESCRIBE

This is an ARTS project that addresses pedestrian safety at the intersection of OR99 (N. Main St.) and Water St. in the City of Ashland. This safety project was originally submitted by ODOT as a 18'-21' ARTS project in an effort to reduce pedestrian crashes at this downtown location that experiences relatively high bike and pedestrian volumes.

Potential Solutions (Program Manager/Project Sponsor)

DESCRIBE

This project proposes to install the following:

- 1) Install a new traffic signal at the intersection of N. Main St. (OR99) & Water St.
- 2) Incorporate modifications to the "Beaver Slide" in partnersip with the City of Ashland, as feasible. Modifications may include closing the Beaver Slide to vehicular traffic while maintaining access for bike and pedestrian traffic.

The proposed improvements will enhance pedestrian safety and reduce the frequency and probability of pedestrian crashes at this intersection by providing protected crossing opportunities for bike and pedestrian traffic.

Project Outcomes, Goals and Priorities (Program Manager/Project Sponsor)

DESCRIBE

The goal of this project is to improve pedestrian safety within the City of Ashland. This project will accomplish this by installing a traffic signal that will provide protected crossing opportunities for bike and pedestrian traffic at the intersection of OR99 & Water St. This project should be delivered in partnership with the City of Ashland, and possible modifications to the adjacent "Beaver Slide" should be incorporated if feasible.

Constraints and Risks (Program Manager/Project Sponsor)

DESCRIBE

This is a joint project between the City of Ashland and ODOT. Most of the work will occur on ODOT R/W, however there is a potential for some work to be conducted on the City of Ashland R/W. This project will require close cooperation and partnership with the city in order to deliver a finished product that meets both ODOT and the City's goals of improving pedestrian safety.

STRE approval will be required for the signal installation of a signal at this location. It is assumed that a pedestrian signal warrant can be achieved based on preliminary pedestrian traffic counts.

It is assumed that ADA ramps at this location will be completed as part of the "KN22208 Jackson and Josephine County ADA Curb Ramps" project.

This project will likely impact parking adjacent to the OR99 @ Water St. Signal. It may be necessary to evaluate options, and potentially add scope to the project to mitigate the loss of parking.

This memo addresses the setting of RVMPO member dues. Staff is seeking a recommendation on the dues for the coming year.

RVMPO Member Dues

Staff proposes maintaining the dues formula and rate that was approved by the Policy Committee in February of 2013. The rate, \$0.16 per capita, would generate a total of \$30,316 for the 2021-22 fiscal year.

Table 1, below, summarizes population and proposed dues for each jurisdiction. Population estimates are from the July 1, 2019 estimates from Portland State University.

RVMPO TAC Memo: FY2021-22 RVMPO Dues Recommendation, UPWP Discussion

February 3, 2021

Dues provide funding for general operations, primarily activities that require local funds including lobbying and local match obligations. Dues pay for Policy Committee participation in advocacy activities for which federal funds cannot be used, including the Oregon MPO Consortium, the Association of Metropolitan Planning Organizations and the West Coast Corridor Coalition. Dues can also be used to supplement the MPO's planning budget.

Table 2 summarizes anticipated use of FY2021-22 member dues.
