Requested Action:

Approve recommended projects for the Carbon Reduction Program 2023 Small Urban and Rural Call for Projects and Statewide project selection process.

Background:

The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law provided funding for projects that reduce transportation related greenhouse gas emissions. Through the carbon reduction program, Oregon is apportioned \$82.4 million over 5 years for fiscal years 2022-2026. These funds are allocated by federal formula to Transportation Management Areas, small urban and rural areas, and statewide projects.

Carbon Reduction Program Decision Making Process

As required by federal regulations, the Oregon Department of Transportation (ODOT) coordinated with the state's transportation management areas and consulted with our regional planning organizations by convening a consultation group. The consultation group met over a dozen times during 2022 and 2023. The consultation group consisted of metropolitan planning organizations, transportation management areas, and other state partners to inform the development of the program and strategy.

The consultation group developed strategies and priorities to guide the implementation of the program based on the *Statewide Transportation Strategy: A 2050 Vision for Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reduction*, which serves as Oregon's roadmap to reducing transportation emissions from the transportation sector. ODOT and the consultation group reviewed the statewide transportation strategy categories to identify emissions reduction actions that were consistent with the eligible project types outlined by the carbon reduction program. The consultation group then worked collaboratively to refine these elements into a set of strategies and priorities to guide the program. These strategies and priorities guided project identification and selection for all funding components of the program.

Following development of the program strategies and priorities, a smaller subset of the group that represented the non-transportation management area metropolitan planning organizations, cities and counties developed project scoring criteria for the small urban and rural funding. ODOT used these scoring criteria to identify projects for the statewide funding component.



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ODOT conducted a call for projects in 2023 for half of the small urban and rural funding (\$12.5 million allocated). Transportation management areas identified projects for their share of the funding (\$24.3 million allocated). ODOT conducted an internal project selection process to award about 60 percent of the statewide funding (\$17.8 million allocated).

After project selection, the consultation group reviewed the identified projects and provided input on the project list. The consultation group also contributed to the development of the carbon reduction strategy, a reporting requirement of the carbon reduction program.

Carbon Reduction Program Recommended Projects

Projects selected to date for carbon reduction program funding meet the program's key goal of reducing transportation related greenhouse gas emissions. The types of projects selected include intelligent transportation systems, electric vehicles and charging stations, low carbon materials, active transportation, and public transportation projects.

ODOT has worked to ensure that the projects selected meet equity goals of the carbon reduction program known as the Justice40 Initiative which aims to have 40 percent of funds benefit disadvantaged communities. Over 65 percent of Oregon's carbon reduction program funds allocated to date will support projects that meet the disadvantaged community requirement and support ODOT's equity goals.

Carbon Reduction Program beyond the Recommendation

ODOT staff is working to have intergovernmental agreements completed with new grantees of the small urban and rural funding in place by early 2024. A second call for projects will be conducted for the small urban and rural funding will take place in spring of 2024.

SUBJECT: Consent Item 11 – Amend the 24-27 Statewide Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) to reallocate a portion of HB 2017 State Safety Priority Funding (SSPF) to establish and implement an ongoing pedestrian and bicycle safety improvement initiative

Requested Action:

Approve the attached list of modified or canceled projects to the STIP.

Background:

At the March 9, 2023 meeting, the OTC supported an ODOT proposal to invest HB 2017 State Safety Priority Funds (SSPF) annually, FY 2025-2027 to create a new pedestrian and bicycle safety program (March 9, 2023 Agenda Item H). The purpose of the program is to consistently and rapidly review, assess and deliver safety improvements addressing pedestrian and bicyclist fatalities on the state highway system, particularly in low-income and Black, Indigenous, or People of Color (BIPOC) communities.

ODOT staff have since refined a program framework and approach for a Vulnerable User Crash Response Program (VCR). The term "vulnerable users" refers to road users who are not using a vehicle that provides a protective shield (e.g., people walking, biking, using a scooter or personal conveyance) and thus are more vulnerable to injury or death when involved in a crash. This term is consistent Oregon's "Vulnerable Road User Law" adopted in 2007 and the recently enacted Federal Highway Administration requirement for all state DOTs to conduct a "Vulnerable Road User Safety Assessment" as part of their State Highway Safety Plans (referred to as the Transportation Safety Action Plan in Oregon). VCR will implement the program recommendations obtained from OTC and an independent consultant evaluation of ODOT's existing safety programs.

The attached table lists SSPF funded projects in the 2024-2027 STIP identified for cancelation or modification to support implementation of the VCR program and its objectives. SSPF funds were added to these projects prior to adoption of the 2024-2027 STIP so it was not possible to make this adjustment to the draft 2024-2027 STIP and an amendment is now needed. Projects identified for cancelation do not include vulnerable user safety improvements in high crash and equity locations. Projects identified for modification will have scopes adjusted to remove elements that do not

improve vulnerable user safety or to add vulnerable user safety improvements that support VCR objectives. This amendment makes \$10,655,521 in state funds available for ODOT to implement the VCR program in FY 2025-2027 per OTC direction.

Outcomes:

With approval, ODOT will modify or cancel the attached projects in the 2024-2027 STIP and implement the VCR program.

Without approval, no state funding will be available to implement the VCR program and it will be put on pause until funds are identified.



What if I don't travel much?

What if my transportation habits during the study aren't my "typical" habits?

That's no problem - we still encourage you to participate. We'll also ask about your typical travel habits, how your travel has changed over the past year, and how you think you'll travel in the future.

How was I selected to participate?

Invited households were selected at random from the State of Oregon.

I was invited to use the study smartphone app, rMove. How does it work?

After you download rMove and sign up, rMove will log your trips for one week while you go about your daily life. Each day you'll be asked to complete a short daily survey about your travel habits as well as a trip survey about each trip you make.

What do I get for participating?

You will receive a gift card once **all members of your household have reported their travel and completed their surveys.** If your household participates using the smartphone app, rMove, each adult will receive a gift card after completion (e.g., a household with two adults receives two gift cards). **All adult household members must complete the study to be eligible for gift cards.** Households that report their travel online or by calling in will receive a single gift card.

How much time does it take to participate?

It takes about 10 minutes to sign up for the study. Once you sign up, we'll give you instructions for logging your travel and completing the study. Households that log their travel for seven days in the smartphone app, rMove, will spend about 5-10 minutes each day reporting their travel. Households that log their travel online or over the phone will spend about 10 minutes per household member reporting their travel for one day.

Who is sponsoring this study?

This study is sponsored by the Oregon Department of Transportation and Oregon's eight metropolitan planning organizations, working together as part of the Oregon Modeling Statewide Collaborative (OMSC).
